When I think of my hands I think of all that Jesus did with His, and how I have a long way to go to be more like Him. He worked with Joseph in the carpenter shop so I am sure His hands were well worn. He must have carried piles of wood for their heating and cooking too. Jesus' hands



picked up mud and rubbed the eyes of the blind, His hands were laid upon the lame and deaf. His hands were gentle too when they caressed the heads of the chil-

dren and spoke gently to them. Jesus used His hands for praying always to His Father in heaven, and they outstretched to call all who were heavily burdened to come to Him and find rest. Finally the hands of Jesus contained the nail holes from His crucifixion. These gentle and courageous hands are now marked with the sign of His sacrifice for us all.

St. Francis, too, was so much like Christ that his hands laid bricks to rebuild Churches, lifted the weary, gave comfort to the suffering and prayed constantly. Near the end of St. Francis' life his hands received the same nail holes as Christ.

I can dial the phone to call a lonely person, I can still bake some cookies for a new neighbour, I can still write a note to a shut-in. The best thing I can still do is pray. Our parish priest gave a wonderful homily a few weeks ago about his professor in the seminary in Poland. Whenever he greeted a priest he would gently kiss their hands! From Belleville for a Formation workshop to Merlin for a Day of Recollection, to Welland for fraternal elections, and to North Bay for their celebration of Canonical Establishment. 

#### FROM THE TREASURER

#### 2016 World Youth Day

In just a few short weeks the Catholic Youth of the world will meet in the name of Christ. Some of them may later hear the CALL and join us, Secular Franciscans.

These saintly events of World Youth Days were initiated by Saint Pope John Paul II, and continue under the patronage by His successors, Holy Father Benedict XVI and Holy Father Francis.

This year's theme *is Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy.*" (*Mt 5:7*) and the event takes place in Krakow – Poland. As always, the location and the theme fit wonderfully: during the Year of Mercy, and in Poland, which is celebrating its 1050<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Christianity.

What are the main goals of World Youth Days? Like with all pilgrimages, the goals are: celebration of Universal Church, listening to the Word of God, celebrating Sacraments (especially Penance and Eucharist,) and overall joyful proclamation of Jesus Christ; The Lord and The Saviour.

The World Youth Days have two profound holy signs, the Cross and the Icon, given to the youth by Pope

John Paul II. These signs, not only accompany the young people during the Youth Days, but travel around the world,



and gather hundreds, even thousands of people praying at any given day. The World Youth Day cross has many names: the Jubilee Cross, the Pilgrim Cross, the Youth Cross. It was entrusted to the youth as they were given the commission to "*carry it throughout the world as a symbol of Christ's love for humanity, and announce to everyone that only in the death and resurrection of Christ can we find salvation and redemption.*" The Cross set out with the young people from St. Peter's in 1984 and has since been carried around the world, making a pilgrimage from parish to parish, diocese to diocese, and country to country. On the same occasion, Pope John Paul II entrusted to the youth an icon of the Blessed Mother that would accompany the cross. "It will be a sign of Mary's motherly presence close to young people who are called, like the Apostle John, to welcome her into their lives," said the pontiff.

So, soon, in just 2 weeks the young people will share their faith with each other, in Krakow and in other major cities in Poland. In Krakow, some of the major sites are: the fourteen century Gothic Ba-

silica of St. Mary and the oldest church in Krakow, St. Adalbert. Two other significant sites are the "Have No Fear" Pope St. John Paul II Shrine, and the Divine Mercy Shrine to St.Faustina at Lagiewniki.



FRANCISZKANSKA 3 (that is, 3 Franciscan Street) is another significant location. There is a very special window there, called "The Papal Window." This Franciscan monastery complex has been the traditional residence of Krakow bishops since the late 14th century, and was the residence of Pope John Paul II during his stays in the city. He used to give his blessings and talk to his followers from a window above the main entrance at night. So many times Holy Father was there, enjoying the company of young people singing with them long into the night.

Please join me in prayers, for the fruits of The World Youth Days 2016, and for the safe journey for all the Pilgrims and all participating.
