

A MOMENT WITH THE MINISTER

Have you noticed that the language St. Francis uses is often a repeat of the words from the Bible? When greet-



"The Lord bless you and keep you.

May He show His face to you
and have mercy.

May He turn His countenance to you
and give you peace.

SPIRITUAL ASSISTANT

This year marks the 800th anniversary of the encounter of Saint Francis with the Sultan, al-Malik al-Kamil. This was probably the first meeting of two holy men of the Christian and Muslim faiths. It



occurred during the Fifth Crusade and the siege of the Egyptian city of Damietta which is at the mouth of the Nile River. Francis, the man of peace, was horrified by the fighting and the atrocities committed by both forces. Francis appealed to the Christian leaders to seek a truce and to initiate negotiations for a peace agreement. But they ignored his suggestions and mocked him.

So he and Br Illuminatus, who knew a few words of the Arabic language, crossed no man's land and headed towards ak-Kamil's headquarters. They were captured by the soldiers, and unbelievably they were not killed. In fact they were brought before the Sultan. The Sultan recognized in Francis a fellow holy man. Against the advice of his advisers – who recommended killing Francis, the usual punishment for Christians in a Muslim land who, thought allowed to practice their faith, were legally subject to capital punishment should they try to preach conversion away from Islam – he spared Francis and even invited him to spend a week with him as an esteemed guest.

While we know nothing of the content of the conversations between Francis and the Sultan, we do know that Francis and Illuminatus left a week later, untouched and unharmed. The Sultan offered gifts to Francis but he refused them, which impressed al-Kamil even further.

Both were changed by the encounter. Francis had left for Damietta with martyrdom on his mind. He hoped the Sultan would have him executed, so he could die what he deemed a glorious, saintly death. Instead he returned to Italy and three years later after an extended period of prayer on Mount La Verna would receive the stigmata of Christ. The Sultan also was changed. He allowed safe passage for pilgrims wanting to go to Jerusalem and gave care of the holy shrines to the Franciscans.

The topic of the National Spiritual Conference this year will be about this very encounter of St. Francis and the Sultan. It is being held at Loretteville, Quebec from October 10-13. Friar Michael Cusato, OFM, will be the presenter. I do hope many of you can make this conference. The cost of the conference is \$250.00. 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
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

Jean Vanier Remembered

The Archdiocese of Toronto remembers Jean Vanier, the Canadian humanitarian, Catholic theologian and moral leader, who passed away on May 7, 2019 at the age of 90.

In 1963, Vanier saw that many people with intellectual disabilities lived lonely, isolated lives. He created communities where those with disabilities were respected and their gifts were shared, called L'Arche (the ark). North America's first L'Arche community — Daybreak — opened in Richmond Hill, Ont., in 1969.

Today there are more than 150 L'Arche communities in 38 countries. Vanier left his mark on Canada: he wrote more than 30 books, was a Massey lecturer, a Nobel Prize nominee and was awarded the Order of Canada. On Vanier's passing, Archbishop of Toronto, Cardinal Thomas Collins, said: In his simple, humble and loving way, inspired by the Gospel of Jesus Christ, Jean Vanier taught us to value the dignity of every individual. In a world that increasingly pushes us to gauge success and worth by what we own or who we know, he reminded us that authentic love, friendship and community are what we really need. L'Arche communities, in Canada and in more than 35 countries throughout the world, will continue his legacy of unconditional love offered to every individual. May his example of peace and gentle care live on through those he inspired for years to come. We give thanks to God for his life.

VICE MINISTER The Languishing Heart

The month of June is my favourite month of the year; not only because it is summer, but because it is the month dedicated to the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

I remember, as a little boy, looking at this picture or statue of the man with the sad eyes, looking out at me and pointing to His heart. I felt drawn to this image without fully understanding.

Pax et Bonum!


